The meeting will be held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the SJE, which in turn runs concurrently with those of the Society of Christian Ethics and the Society for the Study of Muslim Ethics, January 6-9 2011.

We invite submissions on any topic in Jewish Bioethics. We are committed to a pluralistic framework of discourse and welcome presentations reflecting the broadest range of orientations to Jewish theology and practice.

Proposals should include: tentative title, abstract (1000 word minimum, 1500 maximum), principal works cited, and contact information of the presenter (name, institutional affiliation [if any], phone numbers, and e-mail address).
