## BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

### Salli Kirschstein (1869-1935)

Salli Kirschstein was a successful businessman, a philanthropist, an author, and a lover and collector of Jewish artistic and ceremonial objects, of pictures, and of documents of Jewish significance.

The kernel of his collection was acquired in 1908 from Professor Heinrich Frauberger, a non-Jew. Professor Frauberger was the Director of the Duesseldorf Museum, the founder of the Society for the Study of Jewish Art and Antiquities, and a collector of "objects relating especially to Jewish religious culture." Even after Oko's purchase of more than 6,000 items of Jewish artistic and ceremonial objects and approximately 75 books, enough treasures were left in Kirschstein's possession to enable him to hold a sizeable auction in Munich in 1932. In preparation for this auction a catalogue named Die Judaica Sammlung S. Kirschstein (Munich, Hugo Helbing, 1930) was printed.

The artifacts acquired by Oko are now in the Hebrew Union College Sirball Museum in Los Angeles, California, and the books have been integrated into the Klau Library.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This inventory is concerned with the manuscripts (1571-1963) which constitute only a small part of the KIRSCHSTEIN PURCHASE. They are divided into the following sub-collections:

- A. Prussia (1689-1924), Boxes 1-9.
- B. Mecklenburg (1739-1882), Boxes 10-14.
- C. Germany-Other (1571-1963), Boxes 15-19.
- D. Lindenberg Correspondence (1870-1895), Boxes 20-22.

With hardly an exception, the documents in the first three sub-collections deal with German or German-speaking Jewry. The records are either produced by German Jews, addressed to German Jews, or refer to German Jews. In addition to German and Judeo-German, Hebrew, Aramaic, French, Polish, Hungarian, English and Dutch are used with varying frequency. The use of Hebrew and Judeo-German decreases markedly after the beginning of the nineteenth century.

The rationale for creating the sub-collections is as follows:

Prussia, the ever-growing and ultimately largest part of Imperial Germany is represented by enough documents to fill nearly half of the collection's boxes. Berlin, having been the pre-imperial and even pre-Prussian residence of the House of Hohenzollern, has a leading position even in the subcollection. Prussia, then, represents a well-rounded unit in the totality of the KIRSCHSTEIN COLLECTION. It foreshadows and finally exemplifies the aspirations and ambitions of German unification.

According to Dr. Leopold Donath<sup>1</sup>, 900 Jews lived in Mecklenburg-Strelitz in 1802, 600 of them in Alt-Strelitz, the others in Fuerstenberg and Mirow, practically none in Neustrelitz. In 1925, when there were about 600,000 Jews in all of Germany, 1,407 lived in the two Mecklenburgs combined: 1,225 in Mecklenburg-Schwerin and only 182 in Mecklenburg-Strelitz.<sup>2</sup> The two Grand-Duchies or Free States combined constituted approximately one thirtieth of the Weimar Republic. Yet, the contents of five of the twenty-two boxes of the KIRSCHSTEIN COLLECTION pertain to Mecklenburg, the vast majority of the material to Mecklenburg-Strelitz. Mecklenburg-

Strelitz is only one-third the size of Mecklenburg-Schwerin. Strangely again, a disproportionately large number of documents refers to Fuerstenberg, where in 1802 less than one third of the Mecklenburg-Strelitz Jews resided. On the basis of these criteria, this material was separated into a subcollection. The researcher's attention is called to a sizeable number of small and little known Mecklenburg towns listed in the Subject Tracings. Possibly mini-communities existed there, or individuals and tiny groups of Jews who might have carried on their traditions in these localities. An extraordinarily large number of documents of this subcollection date from the period 1825-1847 (11/8-13/16).

The Germany-Other subcollection represents all materials pertaining to German-speaking Jewry in the KIRSCHSTEIN COLLECTION outside of Prussia and Mecklenburg. However, geographically and linguistically these documents at times transcend the German borders. Some come from the Austro-Hungarian Empire, some from Alsace-Lorraine, which was French before 1871, some from Posen, which was Polish before the 1790's. The French language is used quite extensively in communications from the government and from the Paris Consistoire Generale to outlying communities, particularly Metz. Polish and Hungarian rarely appear.

In the Prussia subcollection, Berlin, Frankfort-on-the-Oder, and Potsdam are the most widely represented geographical areas. In the Mecklenburg subcollection, Fuerstenberg, Strelitz (i.e., Alt-Strelitz) and Neustrelitz predominate. Among the Germany-Other items, such tiny places as Ichenhausen and Huettenbach in Bavaria together with Paris and Metz are found with much frequency.

A large part of the manuscripts are of private, business, communal, and governmental nature. The authors and recipients are dukes, kings, prime-ministers, chiefs-of-police, Christian and Jewish scholars of great renown, writers, poets, composers, and simple every-day people whose names do not appear in any history books. Strangely, Moses Mendelssohn is barely alluded to, and Heinrich Graetz is totally unrepresented.

There are engagement contracts, marriage, halitzah, divorce, and baptismal certificates; documents granting a sovereign's permission to marry, to reside in a certain locality, to ply a certain trade, passports, naturalization documents, records of business transactions, and professional and personal recommendations.

The Lindenberg Correspondence differs markedly from the rest of the KIRSCHSTEIN COLLECTION. It is not concerned with any aspect of German Jewish life at all. It may be of interest to the student of German literary and intellectual history of the early years of

the Hohenzollern Empire.

Approximately 400 letters were addressed to Paul Lindenberg, a newspaper editor and writer. From a small town in Silesia, he moved to Goerlitz to edit the Goerlitzer Nachrichten und Anzeiger. In 1882 he became a member of the staff of the Deutsche Rundschau in Berlin. He was not identical with the latter's editor-in-chief of the same name (1859-1943).

The correspondents are predominately writers and poets. They either reply to Lindenberg's request for biographical material which the latter used for articles in various publications; or they express their gratitude for favorable publicity received through Lindenberg and beg to be remembered by him in similar fashion in the future. They all are intensely patriotic. The Prussian victory over the French and the elevation of the Prussian king to the imperial throne of Germany are a source of profound inspiration to these letter writers. On the other hand, Bismarck, the real empire builder, is never mentioned. Nor does this correspondence so much as hint at the social and economic problems following the flush of victory. However, nothing is heard about Schopenhauer's pessimism or Nietzsche's departure from rational, moral Western thought as exemplified by Kant and Hegel.

Among the better known names represented in these letters are Oscar Blumenthal, Felix Dahn, Rudolf v. Gottschall, Robert Hamerlin, Detlev v. Liliencron, Hermann Lingg, Julius Rodenberg, Franz v. Schoenthan, and Ernst v. Wildenbruch.
